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Message from the Principal

On behalf of Willetton Primary School and the School Board, I present the 2022 Annual Report to you. The report provides a summary of the school's performance throughout the year. It presents details of student performance in academic and non-academic areas as well as school performance in the focus areas of the school's Business Plan.

Additional information and details have been provided to the school community throughout the year in newsletters, through Connect, the school website, and in reports to the School Board and P&C Association. Further to this, information of a more individual nature has been reported or communicated to parents through student diaries, Connect, formal reports, interviews and the Individual Education Plan (IEP) process when appropriate.

The Willetton Primary School community continues to embed a safe, positive, inclusive and collaborative environment that supports our vision 'To develop the whole child to succeed in an ever-changing world'. Despite the challenges and implications from COVID-19 continuing into early 2022, as we became accustomed to mask wearing, RAT distributions, whole classes isolating and the impact of reduced staff, the continuity of learning in the classroom remained our objective.

Remaining connected is core to the balance and wellbeing of our students, staff and community. In 2022, the Business Plan focus area – Mental Health and Emotional Wellbeing remained a priority supporting the health and wellbeing of our students and our staff.

A strong teaching and learning culture continues to grow at Willetton Primary School founded on the commitment of our teaching staff and the partnerships we value with parents, carers and our community. High expectations and clear accountable measures with a collaborative professional environment ensure quality teaching and excellent achievement for our students.

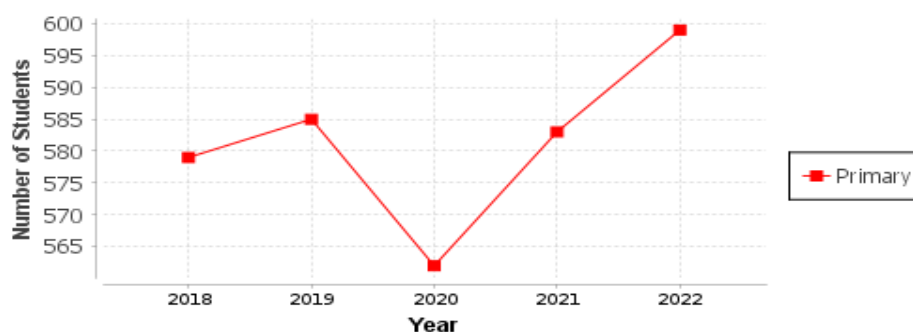

English

Literacy is a strong focus at Willetton Primary with the refinement of whole school approaches and investigation into new approaches. Our highest priority is to improve and strengthen student achievements in all areas of Literacy and to encourage them to be lifelong learners. This is driven by a deeply held belief that every student is capable of successful learning. Literacy blocks occur daily in classes across the year levels, combining both explicit teaching and time for students to practice and consolidate their learning.

In 2022, the English team continued to apply the K–2 Literacy scope and sequence plan for teaching, learning and assessment in reading and phonics. All K-2 teachers have provided feedback and in 2023, the focus is to rewrite this scope and sequence to reflect current trends and a consistent approach to all areas of Literacy. A K-6 Scope and Sequence is a priority for 2023.

In 2022, the English committee invested in more whole class reading sets and small group novel sets in the upper primary area to support their Reading program. Decodable texts continued to be purchased for the ECE area as well as Reading Spine books (highly recommended reading texts) for junior primary. In 2023, the focus will be to boost Reading resources for the middle primary area, as well as continuing to purchase Reading Spine texts in all year levels.

During 2022 all teachers were involved in writing moderation in their year groups. The focus was consistency in grading and comparison of students. Moderation will continue to be a top priority and focus in 2023. 2022 saw more Willetton Primary School staff in K-2 be trained in the Talk for Writing program. It has a strong oral language focus to develop our ECE students' skills in writing. This program, in conjunction with the Seven Steps to Writing Success program in Years 3-6, is developing Willetton students' capacity as writers across the school.

In 2023, the goal in the English Committee will be to select and trial a new whole school approach to Spelling to ensure we have consistent spelling instruction and teaching across all year levels.

Mathematics

Mathematics continued to be a focus area at Willetton Primary School. The aim has been to develop increasingly sophisticated and refined mathematical understanding, fluency, logical reasoning, analytical thought and problem-solving skills. These capabilities enable students to respond to familiar and unfamiliar situations by employing mathematical strategies to make informed decisions and solve problems efficiently.

A focus for our school in 2022 was the implementation of a whole school problem solving framework – The 5C's. Students follow the model of Clarify, Choose, Calculate, Check back, and Communicate. Each class, from P-6, have this common language and approach displayed in their classrooms. Staff meeting time was provided to share with staff how this approach could be implemented in their rooms, as well as whole staff sharing sessions of problem-solving activities.

K-2 classes have continued to move towards hands on approach to learning in Mathematics classes, incorporating manipulatives and a strong focus on Place Value. Classes from Years 3-6 have utilised iMaths resources, both book and online, to implement their classroom programs.

Número was once again implemented across the school to develop fluency in operations and provide students with extension and challenge opportunities. Our teams performed brilliantly in state competitions with two teams making finals and one team finishing second. We are very proud of the results!

Willetton Primary School took part in the Maths Olympiad series of competitions for the fifth year in 2022 and, even with continued disruptions due to COVID, we placed in the top 10% of schools nationwide. Students were selected through a testing process conducted early in the year after self-nomination. As happens every year, far more people nominated than the team had places for. The 30 team members were selected for both their mathematics skills and their abilities with problem-solving, a key skill required for success in the Maths Olympiad series of tests. The Olympiad team met every Monday after school for a practice session and team members sat the five separate tests during their lunchtimes on nominated dates throughout the year.

The combined efforts of the Mathematics Curriculum Committee and year level teams, provide Willetton Primary School with the opportunity to successfully implement whole school programs, as well as achieve excellence across all year levels.

HaSS (Humanities and Social Sciences)

In the Humanities space, and after many whole school events had been disrupted due to Covid, Willetton Primary School classes came together to celebrate NAIDOC week. Each year level accessed information from the NAIDOC website and shared in cultural awareness activities, based on the theme, Get Up, Stand Up, Show Up.

On June 27th, the whole school participated in a hand painting activity. Three large canvases were laid out on long tables in the undercover area with the words of change, recognition, reform, truth, and unity, as the focal point. It was fabulous to see our diverse community of students coming together to place their own handprint to mark their inclusion and place in our wonderful school and country. In doing so, we were able to pay respects to First Nations Peoples and send a clear message to our community that everyone belongs.



In Term 3 we inaugurated a new whole school fundraiser for our Cambodian sister-school, Phnom Cheal Primary School - Rice Bowl Day. It was a huge success, not only because we were able to raise \$2500 for our sister-school, but we were finally able to invite our parent community back into the school. Parents from every classroom volunteered, donated money and rice, and even lent their home rice cookers. Many came in to cook and serve our 600+ students a bowl of rice for lunch. Students wrote reflections on the day with an overwhelming sense of appreciation for their own life and advantages. We are well on our way to embedding a truly philanthropic and empathetic school culture.

Music

2022 was my first year at Willetton Primary School in the position of Music Specialist. With Covid effects still influencing Term 1 activities, it was a slower start to the year.

Choir commenced Term 2, with approximately 70 children interested in being a part of the choir. They rehearsed Wednesday afternoon's from 3pm to 4pm. The major performance in 2022 for the choir was the Massed Choir Festival, where choirs from across other Education Department Schools came together at the Perth Concert Hall to sing and create music.

Throughout the year, we had several Music focused assemblies which involved the IMSS students (Instrumental Music School Services) performing for the school. The school choir also performed as well as a selected class. This gave these students a focus to practice to perform in front of their peers.

Anzac Day unfortunately was delivered online. Each class in Term 1 was given the opportunity to sing the Anzac Day focus song which was 'Spirit of The Anzac' as performed by Australian artists Lee Kernighan and other Australian Idol winners. The Music Room was converted into a makeshift recording studio. Each class had the opportunity to record the song along with a backing track. Postproduction of combining a few classes together to make it sound like a full choir singing the song was done behind the scenes.

At the beginning of the year, the School P & C approved the purchase of a class set of African Drums (Djembe) for children to use. Area 15 had the honour of performing an African tune called 'Kpanlogo' at one of the Music assemblies, performing with incredible rhythm and accuracy.

At the end of the year, each class performed a Christmas song at our Christmas Concert. This was one of the first times in 2022 where the parents attended on mass to see their children perform musically. The staff even showed their talents with a "Willetton" version of the 12 days of Christmas.

IMSS at Willetton Primary school continued to be a very strong aspect of the Music Program. The school offered 6 different instruments – Violin / Viola, Cello, Double Bass, Classical Guitar, Clarinet and Trumpet. This will continue into 2023 with the same number of places being offered. We are very fortunate to have a Willetton Orchestra who practice every Thursday morning under the baton of Mrs Deanne Rochat. They had the opportunity to perform at an Assembly at the end of the year.

2023 will see the choir receive a face lift with brand new Choir Shirts. Again, a huge thank you to the Willetton P&C for providing the funds to purchase these. The shirts will be utilised for any musical performance, not just for the choir. We look to complete the African drums collection with a few different sizes for the children to play. Choir again will be involved in the Massed Choir Festival. We are also looking at having a musical performance (incursion) to allow the students of Willetton Primary School to experience a live performance from professional musicians.

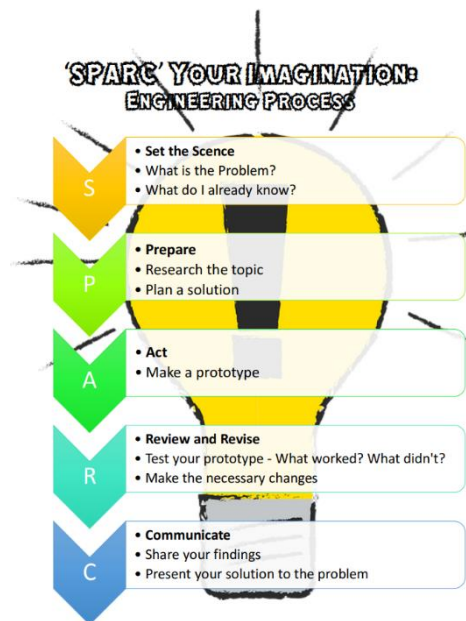

STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, Mathematics)

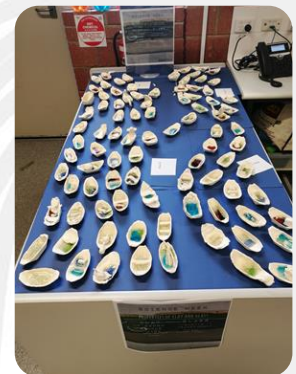
One of our key strategies to support Willetton Primary School students to succeed in an ever-changing world is to engage our students in project-based learning. The whole school focus on integrating Science, Technologies, Engineering, Arts and Mathematics (STEAM) into project-based learning continued to see students engage enthusiastically and creatively in real world problems and apply their understanding of each discipline in integrated and innovative ways. All year levels continued to apply the successful SPARC Engineering inquiry skills process into a range of projects throughout the year. See our support graphic below.



Science Week Theme STEAM Project Open Day

Each term, STEAM projects are integrated to support the content area of Science that students are learning – Biological, Chemical, Physical and Earth & Space Sciences. The focus of the Term 3 STEAM projects supported the Science Week Theme, were collaboratively planned by Teachers in their year levels and, were showcased to families during Open Night. The 2022 National Science Week Theme was “Glass – More than meets the eye.” The year level projects below explored aspects of glass in our lives:

- Variety of stained-glass projects,
- Glass gem suncatchers,
- House designs that included glass windows to maximise light and heat,
- Glass artworks
- Investigations into the properties and creation of glass
- Marble runs
- Microscopes and
- Projectors.



STEAM Resource Room

We developed a STEAM Resource Room where students could choose from a wide range of materials to help construct their project. Previously we had a dedicated STEAM Room where teachers could take their classes, however due to increasing enrolments the room needed to be converted into a classroom. Teachers and students now access resources, materials and equipment from the STEAM Resource Room and projects are completed in their classrooms.

2022 in STEAM saw the ongoing purchasing of resources, materials and storage equipment. This included the replacement of damaged robotics equipment. Staff were accessing Remida for reusable materials and will now trial the development of recycling drives in 2023 to further supplement consumable resource choices for student projects.

We developed a borrowing system for the STEAM resource room. This enabled students to source materials that they think may match their project – students chose materials based on their understandings of the properties and uses of materials and tools.

Digital Technologies Specialist

One of our strategies for improvement in teaching and learning is to embed purposeful use of digital technology. To implement this strategy, students from Year 1- 6 experienced the commencement of a Digital Technologies Specialist Teacher in 2022. The Specialist Digital Technologies Teacher role was created to provide explicit Digital Technologies and Coding skills to students to then apply in classroom learning settings such as STEAM projects and inquiry-based learning.

We look back on 2022 and acknowledge we achieved success with increasing opportunities for students to create solutions through the STEAM design process with and without digital technology. Their enthusiasm, participation and development of projects are also a testament to this success. Our future direction includes:

- Supporting the SPARC process with Habits of Mind in all year levels,
- Continuing to support Science Specialist content by integrating current topics into class STEAM projects,
- Creating a suggested topic schedule for each year level including the STEM learning project resource as a guide,
- Developing a Recycling Drive as one strategy to ensure students have access to suitable resource choices for their projects
- Opportunities for staff to collaboratively plan
- Opportunities for staff to engage in contemporary best – practise professional learning in all aspects of STEAM – Science, Technologies, Engineering (Design and Digital), the Arts and Mathematics
- Students participating in computational thinking projects and
- Continuing to showcase STEAM Science Week theme projects during our Open Night.
- Reintroducing Coding Clubs, and extensions groups such a Wired into Willetton

Physical Education

Before School Sport

At Willetton Primary School, students can sign-up to a Before School Sport Program and Basketball program that focuses on key areas of the Physical Education curriculum. Each student who participated in these carnivals demonstrated all four school values and were determined to try their best.

Swimming Carnival

Willetton Primary School continued to hold their annual Faction Swimming Carnival. It was a fantastic, but very humid, swimming carnival in which students and staff persevered throughout the day. We had fantastic support from parents, who volunteered with marshalling, time keeping, judging, handing out ribbons and of course cheering. The event could not run without the dedication of the entire school community. In 4th place we had Gold, 3rd Red, 2nd Green and 1st Blue. Congratulations to all medal winners on the day.



Cross Country

Term 2 saw all students in Pre-Primary-Year 6 participate in cross country running in preparation for both the school and interschool carnival. Results for the school carnival were 4th place Gold, 3rd Green, 2nd Blue and in 1st place Red. The school community was able to soak up the winter sunshine at the Parklands Picnic to celebrate a successful day. The students who finished 1st to 5th in their Cross-Country year group had the opportunity to participate in the Inter-School Cross Country Carnival held at Piney Lakes Reserve. Willetton performed extremely well, placing 2nd once again and we look forward to going even further in 2023.

Athletics

In Term 2 and 3, students were busy getting prepared for the Faction Athletics Carnival. Pre-primary to Year 6 trained in their Whole School Sport time every Friday. The competitive spirit of all students was outstanding, pushing one another to be the best that they could be. The school community had the opportunity to join in a family picnic on Apsley Oval during the lunch intermission. In 4th place was Gold, 3rd Red, Blue 2nd and Green 1st.

The students who finished 1st and 2nd in their respective events from year 3 to 6 went on to participate in the Inter-school Athletics Carnival. After a day of fierce competition, Willetton finished in 2nd place for the second year in a row. The entire school community were very proud of the effort shown by the athletics team their perseverance throughout the day.



Southern Legends Carnival – NRL

Students who participated in the League Tag SCISA Winter Carnival, in which Willetton won both the girls' and boys' competition, were invited to compete in the Southern Legends Rugby Carnival. Their determination and sportsmanship were on full display as they played their hearts out on the field. Early Childhood Education

In 2022, Early Childhood teachers continued to work towards meeting NQS Quality Area 1. We continued to effectively implement a play-based curriculum which encourages child agency. Play experiences were designed to spark interest and support the curriculum content that was being taught. Students practice skills, solve problems, make decisions, propose solutions and explain ideas in their own words through writing and discussions. The structure of the student's school day allows time to engage in a variety of experiences, both teacher-led, and student-led.

Towards the end of 2022, the Year One and Year Two teachers identified the importance of creating a learning environment that is inclusive, promotes competence and supports exploration and play-based learning. There were many professional discussions about utilising the wet areas as shared play spaces. Through these conversations, the team are excited to implement a play-based learning environment in 2023.

NQS Quality Area 6, Collaborative partnerships with families and communities, was an important emphasis in ECE in 2022. To enhance our sense of community Class Liaison Parents (CLP's) were successfully implemented in all ECE classes. The role of the CLP is an important one to develop good communication and liaison between students, families, teachers, and the school community.

National Quality Standards (NQS)

The National Quality Standards (NQS) sets a national benchmark for quality in education and care services across Australia. Early Childhood Education programs from kindergarten to Year Two in Western Australian schools are required to meet the NQS. In 2022, a NQS Leader was identified, and the Early Childhood staff (K-2) continued to improve our Early Years program delivery in line with the Early Years Learning Framework (EYLF), Western Australian Curriculum and National Quality Standards. For our NQS self-review we rated we rated our school as "meeting" in five areas and as to refine and revise our NQS improvement plan.

Students at Educational Risk (SAER)

SAER students at Willetton Primary School are catered for at their various levels of need. The strategies to support our SAER students in 2022 included:

- Employment of a new, permanent school psychologist and an increase of FTE from 1.5 days a week to 2 days a week. This had an immediate, positive impact on the school.
- Continued implementation of the Rainbows Social/Emotional Program, 0.5 day a week.
- Documented Planning (Individual Education Plans, Groups Education Plans, Individual Behaviour Management Plans, Risk Management Plans and Attendance Plans) to support students' needs.
- Disability Resourcing – additional resourcing in the form of Educational Assistants is used to support students with diagnosed disabilities.
- Regular engagement with outside agencies (Speech Therapists, Occupational Therapists, and Consulting Teachers etc) to develop appropriate programs and support student's additional needs.
- A SAER Policy outlining identification strategies for SAER students and strategies adopted as a school.

Social-Emotional Wellbeing (SEL)

In 2022, Willetton Primary School continued to implement the Friendly Schools Plus (FSP) program to explicitly teach students the five core competencies of social-emotional wellbeing. A focus on building student resilience continued as a result of findings from the AEDC data and PAT Social-Emotional Wellbeing Survey trialled in Term 4 with Year 5 students.

In response to the Covid-19 pandemic, staff morale & wellbeing was a particular focus in 2022 including:

- R U Ok Day celebrations including a staff morning tea and activities
- Staff shout outs as a means for staff to recognise the contributions of their colleagues. The successful winner drawn at each Monday Mini-Meeting receives access to a designated car park for the week
- Monthly action for happiness ideas distributed to all staff
- A staff meeting dedicated to building staff morale in the form of a quiz (known as 'Cluster Wars') which was proudly won by the Cluster 2 team
- Regular staff check-ins by members of the executive team



ICT and Digital Technologies

In 2022, Willetton Primary School continued to provide 0.2 FTE for a teacher to be released as ICT coordinator. The ICT coordinator role provided an opportunity to develop a teacher's leadership and expertise. This role also provided the teacher with the opportunity to upkeep the school's technology as well as supporting colleagues in troubleshooting when required.

School Owned Devices & Connectivity

In 2022 Willetton Primary School continued to provide the following devices to assist teachers and students in developing ICT capabilities:

- 70 iPads in K-2
- 6 iPads for learning support
- 35 teacher iPads
- 33 student Laptops
- eBoards in every classroom

BYO iPad Program Year 3 to 6

Throughout 2022, Willetton Primary School maintained a BYO iPad program from Year 3 to 6. In early Term 4, parents of students in Year 2 (and new students to the school) were invited to join a face-to-face session or live stream via WebEx. Those who were not able to attend those sessions were given the opportunity to watch a recorded version on the school website. In conjunction with Winthrop, different packages were developed to suit family needs. During the information sessions, parents received a handout with package options attached. This information pack was then uploaded to the school website for parents to access at any point.

Teachers from Year 3 to 6 were surveyed at the end of the year, on what apps they would like to use in their year levels for 2023. These apps were checked on the Third-Party Consent catalogue for the level of consent required. These lists will then be sent out to students and their parents at the start of 2023, so they are aware of the apps that are required for the year, for individual year levels.

Junior iPad Program

Willetton Primary School sustained the Junior iPad program and continued to provide 70 iPads across Kindy to Year 2. Teachers worked together and decided when they would use the iPads to best suit their classroom timetable and activity needs. This helps our Year 2 students prepare for entering the BYO iPad program in Year 3.

School Network Updates

Willetton Primary School went through several Wireless Access Point (WAP) and Switch upgrades throughout the year to improve connectivity and speed to further prepare the school for the future. In total there were 30 WAP and 10 switch upgrades.

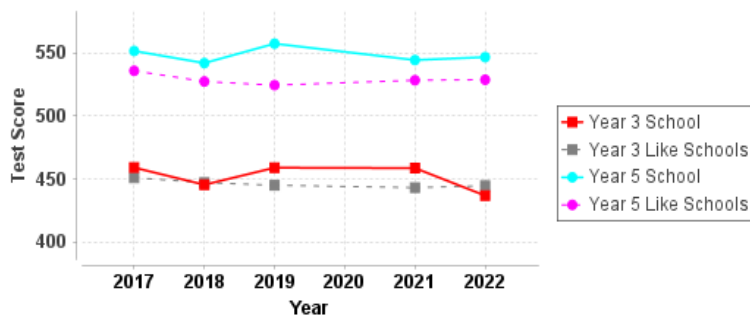
NAPLAN 2022

NAPLAN Longitudinal Performance

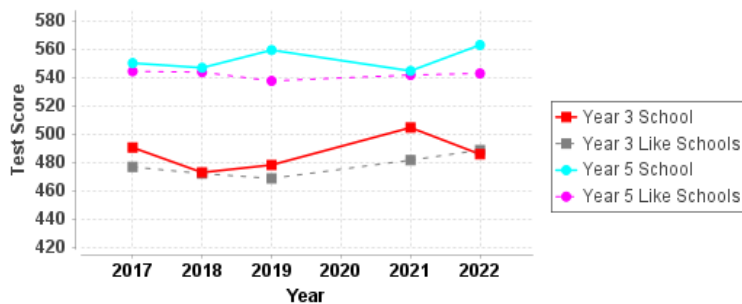
Average Numeracy Score

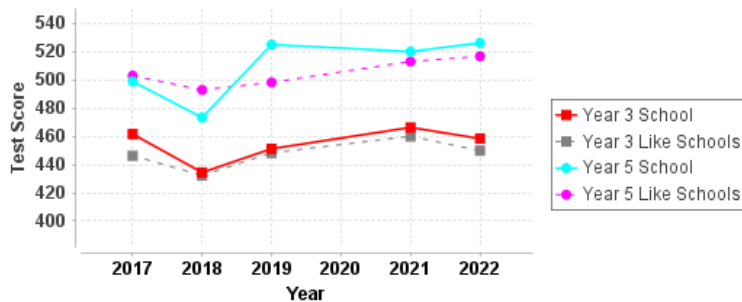
Average Reading Score

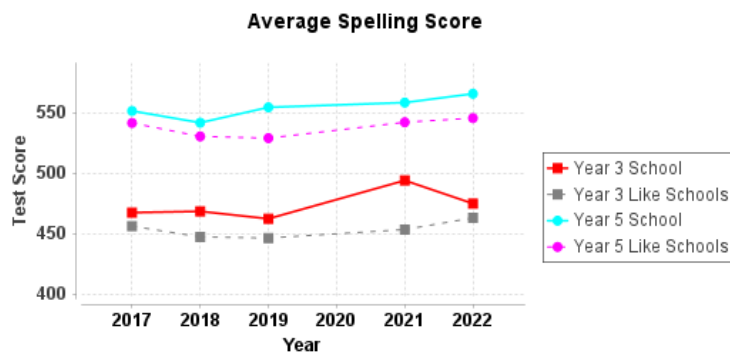

Average Writing Score



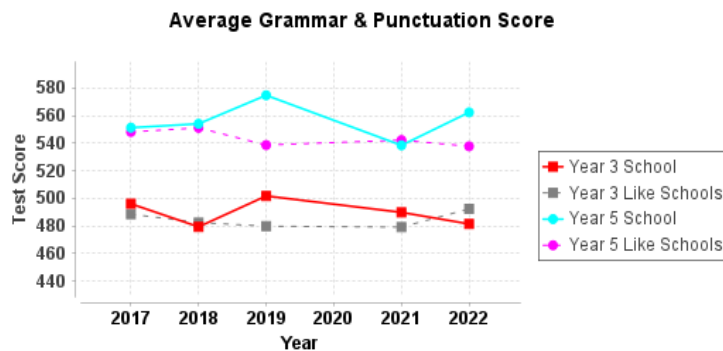

- Continue to implement 'Hubs' to facilitate year level reviews of assessment data to identify areas of strength/development and track student progress.
- Upskill staff in their understanding on Mathematical development and instructional strategies through professional learning through Dr Paul Swan.

ACER Progressive Achievement Testing (PAT)

In 2022, Willetton Primary School continued to utilise online PAT testing across the school to monitor and assess student progress in Literacy and Numeracy. The following PAT tests are conducted in Term 1 and Term 4 each year:

- Reading Comprehension - Years 1-6 (Year 1 Term 4 Only)
- Maths - Years 1-6 (Year 1 Term 4 Only)
- Grammar & Punctuation - Years 3-6
- Spelling - Years 3-6
- Social-Emotional Wellbeing Survey – Trialled in Term 4 by Year 5 students

Testing is conducted in the first few weeks of Term 1 and used as a diagnostic assessment to determine strengths and areas of concern in both individual students and cohorts. Results are then analysed by staff in curriculum, year level and phase of learning meetings to inform future planning.

Recommendations from 2022 PAT Data

- Implement the Social-Emotional Wellbeing Survey for Years 3-6 to support student health & wellbeing – Improvement Driver 2
- Utilise PAT testing to ensure above 90% of students in Years 1-6 demonstrate progress across all testing areas - Willetton Primary School Business Plan 2020-2023: Improvement Driver 1
- Ensure NAPLAN, PAT and On-Entry closely align with teacher judgements - Willetton Primary School Business Plan 2020-2023: Improvement Driver 1

On-Entry

In 2022 all Pre-primary and Year 1 students were assessed in Literacy and Numeracy during Weeks 4 - 7 in Term 1.

The On-entry Assessment program is an assessment for learning, rather than an assessment of learning. Conducting this assessment early in the year ensures that the teacher has information about the current skills and understandings of each child to assist in the planning and delivery of targeted learning programs. Oral language and Writing are two areas of focus for our students, with a large proportion of our students coming from an EAL/D background. As a result of this data, in 2022, we began training all K-2 staff in Talk 4 Writing, with full implementation to occur in 2023.

Our students continued the trend of performing above both the Public School Mean and ICSEA Decile Median.

Data 'Hubs'

In Term 3 2022, Willetton Primary School introduced phase of learning based 'Hubs' where teachers and members of the executive team met to review whole-school assessment data and planned to ensure progress for all students in English and Mathematics.

In line with the Willetton Primary School Business Plan 2020-2023 Improvement Driver 1: Teaching and Learning, the project aimed to:

- Increase the percentage of students achieving moderate to high progress in NAPLAN in Years 5 and 7 to 'at' or 'above' Like Schools
- Ensure above 90% of students in Years 1- 6 demonstrate progress across PAT cycles
- Ensure NAPLAN, PAT and On-Entry closely align with teacher judgements

The Hub approach works on a 5-week cycle and involves:

Week 1

- Year level meet with appointed member of the executive team during collaborative DOTT
- Review relevant school data (EdCompanion, PAT, NAPLAN, On-Entry) and identify focus area
- Teachers develop and administer appropriate Common Assessment Task based on selected focus

Week 2-4

- Teacher's implement teaching program targeted at focus area

Week 5

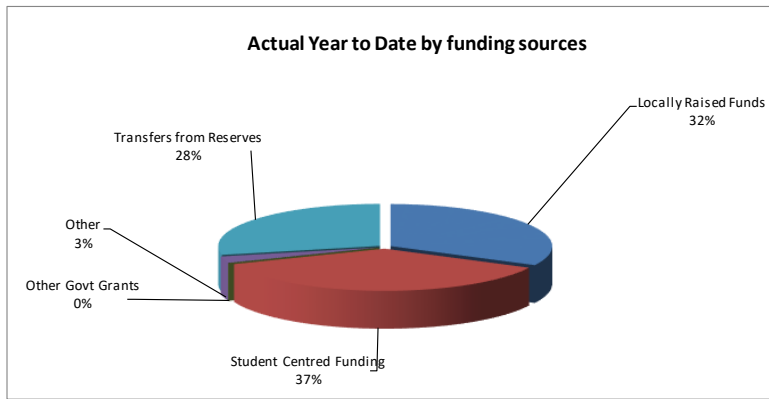
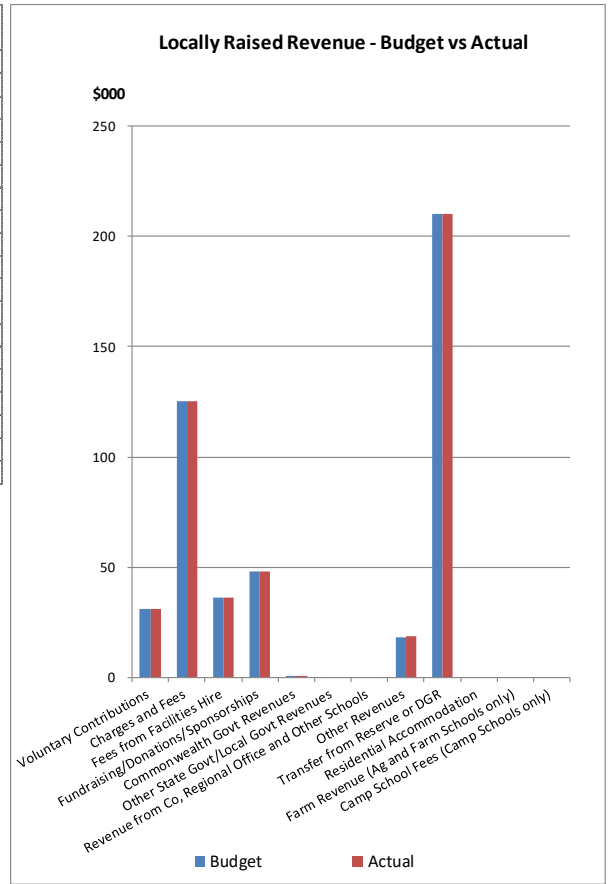
- Teachers' conduct appropriate post-test utilising agreed common assessment task
- Year level meet with appointed member of the executive team during collaborative DOTT to review results and impact of targeted teaching program
- New focus area identified, or previous focus area continued as required

Feedback from both teachers and administrators was incredibly positive. From an administrator's perspective, Hubs provided a valuable insight into Year level planning and needs, better enabling support and resourcing to be directed to the point of need. Teachers noted it was beneficial having dedicated time to review whole-school assessment data with the support of the Curriculum Deputy to identify areas requiring targeted teaching.

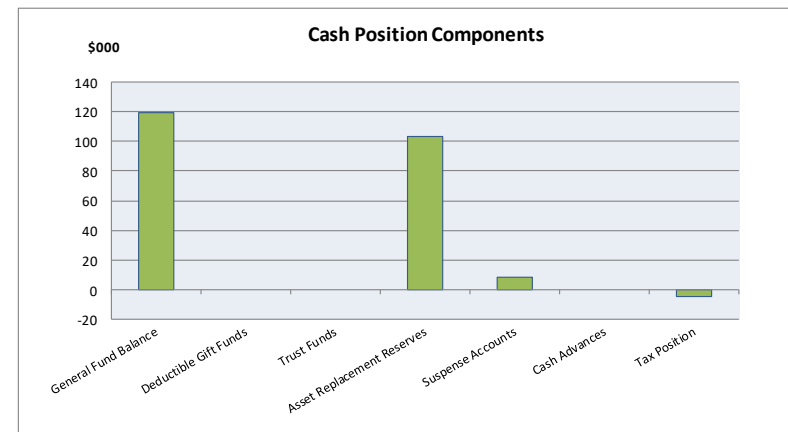
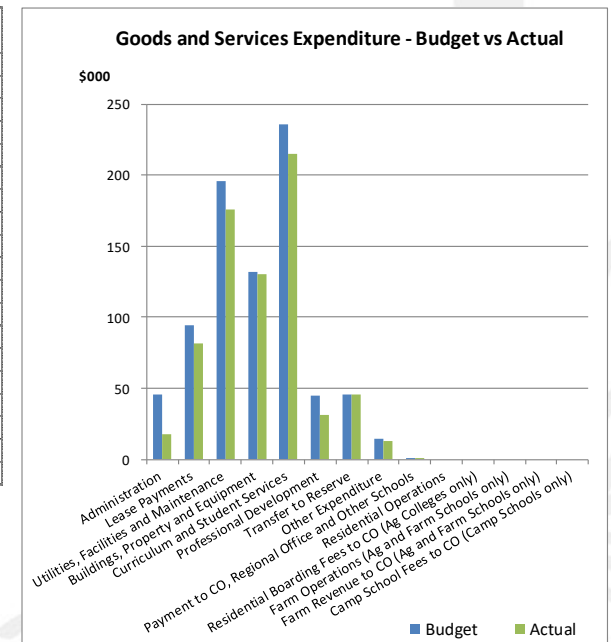


