On Monday 21 October, a spectacular Art Exhibition was held in the new undercover area with artwork created by almost every child from Kindergarten to Year 6 on display. The exhibition was initiated by Mrs Bindi Jones, Year 5 teacher, to raise money for the Angkor project, with the purpose of our school adopting a sister school in Cambodia. Mrs Jones will be a participant in the 2020 Study Tour travelling to Cambodia to establish sister school relationships with Cambodian schools.

The purpose of the two exhibitions on Monday was to raise funds to enhance the education of students in both Cambodia and here in our school.

It was a great pleasure to hear from our special guests, South Metropolitan Regional Education Director, Ms Sue Cuneo, and past Chairperson and originator of the Angkor Project, and retired Director of Schools and Curriculum, Mr John Garnaut. Ms Cuneo and Mr Garnaut addressed parents, carers, visiting Principals, staff, visitors and students about the importance of The Angkor Project collaboration between the Western Australian Department of Education and the [Cambodian Ministry of Education, Youth and Sport](#) that builds sister school relationships to enhance the education of students in both Cambodia and Western Australia.

Our aim, is to continue to sponsor our sister school in the future and for our students to continuously learn from the relationship, and to come to appreciate how much they have, after seeing how little others have, and to teach our students to become good global citizens.

I would like to acknowledge the support Mrs Jones has received from the P&C, staff, all of our students from Kindergarten to Year 6 and our whole wider school community. Congratulations and well done Mrs Jones and everyone involved.

How true is the proverb? We need to help one another raise the children around us. They are our future and they will make the world a better place. Parents always need useful tools in their parenting toolbox. Here are some classroom resilience tips by [bestprograms4kids.com](http://bestprograms4kids.com). So get your cuppa and read below.

Have the best week and enjoy implementing the tips!

1. **Being learning confident** – means asking questions, saying "I don't know." Asking for help and speaking up when you do and don't know the answer. Praise confidence when you see your child showing it in their learning tasks at home.
2. **Giving effort** – "Nothing worth having was ever achieved without effort." – Theodore Roosevelt. The opposite is giving up – which often happens when the going gets tough. Give your child practical examples of how and when you give effort.
3. **Setting goals** – It's one of the seven habits of highly effective people. Goals help to direct effort and identify the resources to get there. Why not set a social, an emotional and a learning goal with your child each term?
4. **Is making mistakes** difficult for your child? Does a big feeling follow making a mistake? Anger, frustration or disappointment? Talk to your child about your mistakes – and what you learned from them. They are stepping stones to learning.

*There are a number of committee members and P&C members moving on at the end of the year so we'd love to see lots of new faces!*

- The **PRESIDENT (Executive)** chairs all General and Executive Committee Meetings of the Association and offers leadership and management of the committee. Works with Secretary on meeting agendas.
- The **VICE-PRESIDENT (Executive)** assists the President, represents the P&C at WACSSO meetings (~1 per term), and chairs meetings when President is absent.
- The **SECRETARY (Executive)** takes care of correspondence and administration documents, takes meeting minutes, maintains a register of members, and notifies the school and WACSSO of the office bearers and committee members before 30 April. Works with President on reporting to the ACNC and Associations Online.
- The **TREASURER (Executive)** is responsible for all monies (receipts, payments, banking, and related documents), provides statement of accounts to each P&C meeting, maintains proper books of accounts and prepares annual financial statements for audit (end December), and forwards a copy of the audited annual financial statements to the school and WACSSO.
- The **FUNDRAISING CO-ORDINATOR** co-ordinates P&C fundraising projects and event teams.
- The **UNIFORM CO-ORDINATOR** liaises with uniform shop, manages the school dress sales, co-ordinates graduation shirt ordering with school, and co-ordinates the second -hand uniform collection & sales. This has been a shared role.
- The **SAFETY HOUSE CO-ORDINATOR** co-ordinates the safety houses in the area and the Safety House activities.
- The **SUSTAINABILITY COMMITTEE** co-ordinates sustainability initiatives and liaises with the school on more sustainable approaches.
- The **KPP LIAISON** co-ordinates Kindy and Pre-Primary events and activities with KPP class reps.
- The **SCHOOL BANKING CO-ORDINATOR** co-ordinates volunteers for school banking and banks student monies.
- The **CANTEEN SUB-COMMITTEE** is a team of parents that oversee the canteen. This committee requires a convener and a treasurer and at least 2 other members, and works with the canteen manager, assistant and volunteers on ensuring a sustainable canteen that serves healthy, delicious food for students and staff.
- The **PR TEAM** work to co-ordinate news and information to school and general community through school newsletter and website, notices to families, P&C notice board, P&C Facebook page and other avenues.

The P&C needs at a minimum 4 office bearers (a President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer) plus 3 other executive members to run and a minimum of 10 financial members at meetings to vote on things. However, many hands make light work and are much more fun.

## Measles

### What is measles?

Measles is a highly infectious disease that is usually spread through air-borne droplets of the virus. It can have serious complications.

Measles is one of the most easily spread of all human infections. Just being in the same room as someone with measles can result in transmission of infection.

It can also be spread through direct contact with the mucous membranes of an infected person, and by touching articles freshly soiled with the mucous and saliva of an infected person.

Everyone born during or after 1966 should be vaccinated against measles.

In the past, measles infection was very common in childhood. Now, due to immunisation, measles infection is rare in Australia.

Measles is a different disease to [German measles](#).

### How do you get measles?

Measles is usually spread when a person breathes in the measles virus that has been coughed or sneezed into the air by an infectious person.

People with measles are usually infectious from just before the symptoms begin (2 to 4 days) until 4 days after the rash appears.

### If you think you have been exposed

If you have never had measles or have not

been vaccinated against measles you are at risk of measles infection.

- If it is less than 3 days since you came into contact with a person with measles, immunisation can prevent you becoming infected.
- If it is more than 3 days and less than 7 days since you came into contact with a person infected with measles, an injection called immunoglobulin can protect you. Immunoglobulin contains antibodies against the measles virus. It is especially recommended for young children (less than 1), pregnant women who have not been immunised and people with other medical conditions who have a greater risk of developing complications if they catch measles.

### Signs and symptoms

The time from exposure to becoming sick is usually about 10 days. The rash usually appears around 14 days after exposure.

The first symptoms of measles are:

- fever
- tiredness
- runny nose
- cough
- sore red eyes.

These symptoms usually last for a few days before a red blotchy rash appears. The rash starts on the face for 1 to 2 days and spreads down to the body. The rash will last for 4 to 7 days.

### Complications

Up to one-third of people infected with measles will experience a complication.





This can include ear infections, diarrhoea and pneumonia, and may require hospitalisation. About 1 in every 1000 people with measles develops encephalitis (swelling of the brain).

### How do I know I have measles?

Measles can be difficult to diagnose early in the illness because there are many other viruses that cause similar illnesses with fever and a rash. Sometimes the presence of white spots inside the mouth, called Koplik spots, the timing of the fever and the rash, and the appearance of the rash can help a doctor to make the diagnosis.

Whenever measles is suspected, a blood test or a swab can be taken from the nose or throat and a urine sample can be collected to confirm the diagnosis in the laboratory.

Confirming the diagnosis is important so that other people who may be at risk of measles can be identified and offered vaccination if they have not been already vaccinated.

**Caution:** when making your doctor's appointment, tell the staff that you may be infectious. You will need to wait in a separate area from others, especially young children.

### Notifiable disease

Measles is a notifiable disease so doctors, hospitals and laboratories must inform the Department of Health of you or your child's diagnosis. Notification is confidential.

Department of Health staff will talk to you or your doctor to find out how the infection occurred, identify other people at risk of infection, and let you know about immunisation and whether you or your child needs to stay away from work, school or group gatherings.

### Treatment of measles

There is no specific treatment for measles. You should rest, drink plenty of fluids, and take paracetamol for fever if required.

### While you have the infection

While you are infectious with measles, up to 4 days after the rash appears, it is important that you stay at home to avoid spreading it to other people.

### How can measles be prevented?

#### Is there a vaccine against measles?

Yes, the [measles, mumps and rubella \(MMR vaccine\)](#) is available.

Unimmunised children who have come into contact with measles and who do not receive MMR or immunoglobulin cannot attend school until 14 days after the rash appeared in the person with measles.

### Remember

- Measles is a serious and highly contagious disease.
- Vaccination has now made measles quite rare in Australia.

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# CHILDREN'S HEALTH STARTS WITH HEALTHY COMMUNITIES.

The places children live, play and go to school, play a big part in how they grow up. We can all help to build the foundations for children to thrive. Our communities can provide quality health care; clean water, air and green spaces; nutritious food options; support for parents; and safe places to play and socialise.

Here are some simple ways that you can play your part:

## CHILDREN THRIVE WHEN PARENTS ARE WELL SUPPORTED:

- Organise informal gatherings so families can get to know each other. This helps to build relationships and connect families.
- Listen to parents and reassure families that we all need support to navigate the ebbs and flows of parenting from time to time.
- Learn about the services in your area so that you can help parents to get the support they need. Focusing on the needs of children can be helpful in encouraging families to seek help.

## CHILDREN NEED HEALTHY FOOD OPTIONS:

- Encourage healthy options for food in your canteen, tuckshop, vending machines, home, shop, or service.
- Organise opportunities for families to come together and share food. This can be a great way to try new foods and build friendships.
- Planting herbs and veggies, or preparing food with children can be great starting points for talking about what foods help us to grow up healthy and strong.

## CHILDREN NEED CLEAN, SAFE OUTDOOR SPACES:

- Advocate for clean safe parks, bike paths, and facilities in your local area. These make it easier for families to be active and to meet others in the neighbourhood.
- Organise an activity to include the ideas of children in designing the spaces that they use - this could be anything from planning their own play space or activity, to contacting your council about what children have said they want and need.

## CHILDREN BENEFIT FROM QUALITY HEALTH SERVICES:

- Show families where they can access information about child development e.g. [www.raisingchildren.net.au](http://www.raisingchildren.net.au), Parentline, local doctor or child health service.
- As children get older, talk to them about how to get information about their own health. Together make a list of all the ways that they might like to access this information.
- Advocate for health services that support all children and adults throughout their lives. Services for families that take into account the needs of children achieve better outcomes for everyone.
