



NAIDOC Week in the Indonesian room years 3-6

As part of our NAIDOC Week studies we learnt about and compared the Indigenous peoples of Australia and Indonesia. We took the information and presented it in a Venn diagram.

The students were fascinated by the vastly different population of each country and the fact that 95% of Indonesians are indigenous whereas only 3.3% of Australians are indigenous.





The year 5 & 6 students learnt about Acknowledgement of Country and looked at some Noongar, English and Indonesian words.

Welcome to Country and Acknowledgement of Country

An 'Acknowledgment of Country' is a way for non-Aboriginal people to show respect for Noongar heritage and the ongoing relationship of traditional owners with the land. Unlike a 'Welcome to Country', which can only be performed by a recognised Aboriginal elder from the relevant language group, an "Acknowledgement of Country" can be performed by Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal people. It is usually the first item on the program for an event, such as a school assembly.

Here is an example of an 'Acknowledgement of Country':


'I respectfully acknowledge the traditional custodians of this land on which we are gathered, the Whadjuk Noongar people. It is a privilege to be standing on Whadjuk country. I wish to acknowledge and respect their continuing culture and the contribution they make to the life of this city and this region.'

The Language of the Aboriginal People of the South West Region of Western Australia

Noongar is the official language of the Aboriginal people of the south-west of Western Australia. The word Noongar means 'a person of the south-west of Western Australia', or the name for the original inhabitants of the south-west of Western Australia. While Noongar is identified as a single language, there are several ways of pronouncing it, which is reflected in the spelling: Noongar, Nyungar, Nyungar,

The Noongar language is made up of 14 different dialects; it is an oral language and the spelling of it is variable. Noongar dialects have changed over time, mixing with English and being adapted into the local English vocabulary, notably with places, plants and animals. Many Noongar people of today grew up speaking English in school and Noongar at home. The children who were taken away to missions – the Stolen Generations – were forbidden from speaking the Noongar language.

Some well-known places in Whadjuk country are: Wadjemup, now known as Rottnest Island; Djarlgarro Beelier, now named the Canning River; and Derbarl Yerrigan, the Swan River.

The Language of the Aboriginal People of the South West Region of Western Australia

Noongar is the official language of the Aboriginal people of the south-west of Western Australia. The Noongar language is made up of 14 different dialects; it is an oral language and the spelling of it is variable.

Noongar dialects have changed over time, mixing with English and being adapted into the local English vocabulary, notably with places, plants and animals. Many Noongar people of today grew up speaking English in school and Noongar at home. The children who were taken away to missions – the Stolen Generations – were forbidden from speaking the Noongar language.

Many modern place names in Western Australia end in -up, such as Joondalup, Nannup and Manjimup. This is because in the Noongar language, -up means 'place of'. Use the Noongar word list on the website https://www.noongarculture.org.au/glossary/noongar-word-list/ to translate the following words.
